Chairperson's Report for the Year Ended 31st March 2018

Dumfries and Galloway Citizens Advice Service has continued to perform extremely well in delivering a wide range of advice and information services to those who most need it across Dumfries and Galloway in the last year.

The environment in which we operate continues to be ever more challenging with an increased demand for our services at a time when our finances are being continually squeezed. It is unlikely that this trend will change in the near future which, from a Board perspective, means that we must continue to exercise sound governance and oversight, provide positive challenge where appropriate and encourage the organisation to operate as efficiently and effectively as possible.

Key to the successful delivery is our Senior Management team who operate under the very positive leadership provided by our Chief Executive Sue Irving. The team provides the leadership, encouragement and guidance to ensure we are delivering in respect of our core contract but also continually scanning to identify a range of funding opportunities to deliver a wider range of services to complement our core activities.

Absolutely central to our delivery are our full time and part time staff, who along with our volunteers have a wide-ranging knowledge and experience, which becomes more technical and valuable as each year passes. As an organisation we must continually strive to ensure we appropriately recognise and understand the commitment our volunteers make and the benefits they deliver to those who use our services. This is extremely important as we need to ensure that current and potential funders properly understand this contribution and the real value of the service we deliver.

Finances continue to be challenging but as an organisation we are responding well and managing our finances positively. We have this past year had to continue under an 'extension' arrangement with our core contract which is not ideal but hopefully this will be resolved in the coming year and enable us to plan effectively. In this respect the Board is very grateful to Dumfries and Galloway Council who are the vehicle for the provision of the funding from the public purse for our core contract.

On behalf of the Board I wish to convey my thanks to the staff and volunteers for their sterling work throughout the year. I also wish to thank my fellow Board members for their commitment and expertise in offering both positive support and challenge to the organisation and ensuring that there is appropriate oversight, scrutiny and advice to all aspects of activity. Two members of our Board retired in the last year, namely, Lorna McGowan and Stella Armstrong and I thank them very sincerely for their contribution to the Board and support of the organisation. In particular Stella who has given many years of valuable service to the organisation in a range of roles.

I believe we have a good balance across our Board and this has been enhanced by the addition of Andrew Walls who has a breadth of expertise and knowledge, which I am sure will benefit the Board and the organisation. We shall endeavour to expand the Board further in the coming year and ensure there is appropriate succession planning in place.

Our challenge is to continually improve and I look forward to continue to work with all staff, volunteers and fellow Board members to provide a quality service to the people who need it most.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31st March 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives of the service, constitution and organisation of work

The purposes of the charity are to ensure that individuals do not suffer, through ignorance of their rights and responsibilities, or of services available, or through an inability to express their needs effectively, and to exercise a responsible influence on the development of social policies.

The charity aims to:

- make a positive difference to people's lives
- engage with, train, develop, support and value our people
- provide accurate, appropriate, confidential, quality advice in a sensitive way to enable citizens of Dumfries & Galloway to make informed choices
- introduce and use quality assurance mechanisms to measure the difference we make and how we make it
- work with others to build our reputation for quality, professionalism, trust and independence

Significant activities

The main services provided by staff and volunteers are as follows:

- Generalist advice services through our four Citizens Advice Bureaux in Annan, Dumfries, Castle Douglas and Stranraer.
- Support4Life specialist advice on social security benefits for people with long term health conditions.
- Tribunal representation advice and support to appeal social security benefit decision.
- Debt advice advising people with complex debts and putting in place appropriate solutions such as negotiating with creditors, Debt Arrangement Schemes and sequestration.
- In Court advice representation services for people at risk of losing their home through eviction or repossession and also support for small claims.
- Housing and homelessness advice and information for people who are, or are at risk, of becoming homeless.
- Prison advice advice on social security and housing for prisoners and families in HMP Dumfries.
- Kinship care advice and information service for families and individuals who are kinship carers.
- Minority Communities advice services for people from ethnic minority communities.
- Patient Advice and Support service advice and assistance for people raising NHS issues and complaints.
- Energy advice to reduce household spend on utilities and maximise available income.

Volunteer Contributions

The charity could not operate without volunteers who provide advice services and also coordinate social policy activity and provide administration support. Our volunteers are also mostly members of the company and so have an important role to play in our governance. As a result two of our Directors are active volunteers and bring those experiences to help shape the Board's strategy and decision making. Our volunteers contributed over 13,000 hours to our services in 2017-18 for which the trustees are very grateful.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The results for the year to 31 March 2018 are set out in the statement of financial activities on pages 9 and 10. The surplus for the year amounts to £50,689 (2017 - £45,079), with funding of £1,310,751 received in the year (2017 - £1,281,973).

During 2017-18 we provided a service to 7,957 people, giving advice 27,825 times and securing financial gains to the value of £8.1million and we helped people to manage their debts of over £12 million. Our quality of advice audit arrangements with Citizens Advice Scotland changed during the year so we are now able to assure high standards on a much timelier basis than the previous three yearly audit. We also began the process of reaccreditation for Type 3 of the Scottish National Standards for Information and Advice Providers and expect to achieve this in 2018-19.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

Funding is mainly received in the form of grants, most of which are specific to particular projects. A full list of funds received from each individual grantmaking body can be found in the Notes to the Financial Statements. The Charity's principal funder continues to be Dumfries and Galloway Council.

Investment policy and objectives

The charity has no investments other than the use of a deposit and 32 Day Notice Account to earn interest on surplus funds held.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

Reserves (from unrestricted funds) are subject to ongoing review by trustees to ensure the level of reserves held is not excessive, or conversely, depleted rapidly without due consideration and authorisation from trustees.

Trustees maintain a level of reserves sufficient to cover the cost of discontinuing activities in the event of such becoming necessary and aim to retain reserves equating to 3 - 4 months' running costs. There are currently total reserves of £541,145 (2017 - £490,456), comprising of £409,520 (2017 - £365,788) in unrestricted funds and £131,625 (2017 - £124,668) in restricted funds. Trustees consider retention of this level of reserves is fundamental to the charity operating efficiently and effectively, demonstrating the charity's resilience in maintaining essential services and minimising the risk of problems with cash flow arising from unplanned or unexpected expenditure.

In the trustees' view, the reserves should provide the charity with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its charitable objectives for the foreseeable future.

The trustees are committed to effecting continuous improvement and development of services throughout Dumfries and Galloway. However, a major concern will be the ongoing financial support secured from funders both locally and nationally and the subsequent and longer term sustainability of services across the region.

Good stewardship is demonstrated by trustees actively managing the charity's finances. The level of reserves held is considered within the budget setting process and in conjunction with the strategic and operational plans, ensuring financial risks are identified and steps taken to mitigate the risks and subsequent impact of funding uncertainties, whilst ensuring longer term sustainability of services.

To date, trustees have not designated the use of reserves, but this may be considered appropriate in the future and in these circumstances trustees will give due consideration to and document the circumstances, amount and timescale surrounding potential designation of funds.

FUTURE PLANS

Our Corporate Plan 2015 - 18 identifies our key priorities for the period ahead.

Funding for core services from Dumfries and Galloway Council continued to be extended throughout the year and, as reported in last year's Trustee's Report, it is anticipated that future services will be procured through competitive tendering.

Other funding that has been continued for variable lengths of time include the In Court Advice Service (Scottish Legal Aid Board), and funding to mitigate the impact of social security reforms (Scottish Government). In addition, we secured funding from the Scottish Government / European Social Fund Aspiring Communities Fund and from a range of sources to deliver energy advice. However, all of these funds are fixed term and not sustainable without direct funding.

In order to plan for likely decreases in funding the trustees remitted the executive team to review our property requirements and, as a result, the Stranraer Bureau relocated in 2018 and work is ongoing to consider options in Dumfries. Our future sustainability will also be addressed by the Board through the risk register and we will continue to develop income streams from other sources.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and is constituted as a company limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006 and is a Scottish Charity.

The Memorandum and Articles were revised in October 2012 in order to be compliant with charity law and good practice. It is also a membership organisation with members open to anyone over the age of 18 other than members of staff.

Governance

At each annual general meeting trustees who have held office for a period of three years retire from office but are eligible for re-appointment. The number of terms served is a maximum of three. The maximum number of trustees is 12 and no more than 2 trustees at any one time can be volunteers.

The Board has considered what skills are required to be most effective and so currently has vacancies to fill and so it is intended to target potential trustees in the coming year. Addressing the gender balance on the Board is a priority, as is increasing diversity.

Organisational structure

The Board of the organisation meets on a quarterly basis and is supported by the Finance Subcommittee, which also meets quarterly, and the Staffing Subcommittee which meets as required. During the year the Board set up an Audit and Risk Subcommittee to improve oversight and management of risk. Day to day responsibility for the running of the organisation is delegated to the Chief Executive who leads the Senior Management Team and has authority for finance, employment and operations.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are provided with an information pack and also spend time with the Chief Executive to ensure they are fully informed of key issues affecting the organisation and its governance. The pack includes their legal obligations under charity law and the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator's guidance on trustees' duties, a copy of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Corporate Plan and most recent audited accounts and Board minutes. The Board holds a planning day on an annual basis and there is an annual "away day" for all staff, volunteers and trustees which ensure that trustees understand the work of the organisation, the key challenges and their role.

Key management remuneration

The pay policy for senior staff is the same as for all staff. The organisation undertook a job levelling exercise using the Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework in 2013-14 and during 2016 put in place a new salary structure in line with this for all staff which allows for incremental increases within pay bands. Pay awards when available apply to all staff.

Wider network

The charity is a member of the Scottish Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux - Citizens Advice Scotland and as a result the company uses the CAB brand.

Related parties

No trustees receive remuneration from their work for the charity other than travel expenses for attending meetings and no related party transactions took place.

The organisation works closely with our key partner and funder Dumfries and Galloway Council and our senior staff hold non-executive positions in partner organisations such as Money Advice Scotland, Homeless Action Scotland, Third Sector Dumfries and Galloway and Dumfries and Galloway Chamber of Commerce. These partnerships enable our clients' needs to be articulated and promoted in a range of operational and strategic settings.

Risk management

The organisation has a risk register which is regularly reviewed and identifies the key risks and uncertainties both current and future. As a result a range of policies and procedures have been developed to mitigate risks and will be overseen by the Audit and Risk Subcommittee.

However the main risk continues to be financial security and sustainability particularly due to the reliance upon funding from Dumfries and Galloway Council. Contract monitoring by the Council evidences satisfactory performance against the key performance indicators but diversifying our funding base is a priority to be addressed through our Income Generation Strategy.

In order to ensure that the organisation is competitive and able to attract funding the Citizens Advice Scotland audit is significant. This has moved from a three yearly cycle to quarterly meaning the audit is significantly more up to date than previously providing reassurance of the high standards of our advice services. We also continue to be the only organisation in Dumfries and Galloway accredited to the highest level of the Scottish National Standards for Information and Advice Providers.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Dumfries and Galloway Citizens Advice Service (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31st March 2018 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31st March 2018

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated in Scotland and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member.

The financial statements relate to Dumfries & Galloway Citizens Advice Service, an individual entity and the presentation currency used is Pound Sterling (£).

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102 applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes the company will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The validity of this assumption depends on a core funding package being secured with Dumfries & Galloway Council following the end of the current contract which expires on the 31 March 2018. On the basis of a new funding package being secured, trustees believe the going concern basis to be appropriate.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

The vast majority of the charitable company's income is in the form of grant funding, both core funding and specific restricted project funding. It also has a relatively small amount of investment income, other donations and training fees.

Income from government and other grants is recognised at fair value when the charity has entitlement after any performance conditions have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. If entitlement is not met then these amounts are deferred.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Support costs

Support costs are mainly payroll related costs but also encompass administrative, general office and governance costs in relation to running the core activity of the charitable company. Support costs are all costs which are not deemed to be directly attributable to particular projects.

Support costs have been allocated between expenditure categories based on the use of resources. costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis, eg staff time. Included within support costs are costs associated with the governance arrangements of the Charity, including the external audit of the charity.

Governance costs

Governance costs are usually professional fees and any other costs relating specifically to the running of the charity at a trustee level rather than day to day operating costs. They are allocated between funds on the same basis as all other resources expended.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

The company's operating expenses are financed from core funding, which is unrestricted. Costs relating to restricted funding activities are allocated to those when incurred.

Intangible fixed assets

Intangible Fixed Assets are recognised at cost on the date of acquisition and are stated at cost less accumulated amortisation.

As intangible fixed assets comprise of a website, amortisation is provided on a straight line basis over three years.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31st March 2018

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets

Freehold property is not depreciated. This represents a departure from the Companies Act requirements to provided for depreciation on such property. The trustees believe this is necessary in order to give a true and fair view of the value of the property at the year end.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the cost less estimated residual value of the assets over their estimated useful life. Computer equipment is depreciated using a 33% straight line method whilst all other equipment is depreciation on a 10% straight line basis.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts or finance leases are capitalised in the balance sheet. Those held under hire purchase contracts are depreciated over their useful lives. Those held under finance leases are depreciated over their estimated useful lives or the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

The interest element of these obligations is charged to the statement of financial activities over the relevant period. The capital element of the future payments is treated as a liability.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company makes payments to NEST in respect of the workplace pension as required by law. Contributions payable to NEST are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Financial instruments

Cash and bank

Cash and bank comprises cash on hand and funds held on deposit.

Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for the provision of services sold in the ordinary course of operations.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price and represent the full value of the services charged to customers, including any amounts charged on for third parties.

Trade creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers.

Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the company does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date they are presented as non current liabilities.

Judgements and estimates

No significant judgements or estimates were made in the year under review.

The charitable company operates a general fund for core administrative activities.

The Housing Project offers advice to people facing homelessness or potential homelessness.

The HM Prison Project helps prisoners on remand and pre-release issues.

The Minority Communities Project provides a dedicated service for people from minority communities with training and support for volunteers to provide a service to their own communities.

The Kinship Care Project helps kinship carers who have taken responsibility for looking after children.

The In Court and Mediation Project assists people with court advice and representation matters.

The Money Advice Service provided one to one guidance on budgeting, saving and borrowing, protection, retirement planning, tax and understanding financial terminology. This project ceased in August 2016.

The Community Jobs Scotland Project is a partnership between the Scottish Government and the Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations to help create jobs within the third sector organisations for primarily 18-24 year olds.

The CAS Energy Best Deal Project aims to help consumers save money by finding the best energy deal for them, and is targeted at those deemed fuel poor or at risk of being fuel poor.

PASS supports individuals to give feedback, make comment or raise concerns about NHS treatment or care and provides practical assistance and support for individuals.

CAS Welfare Reform Extra project aims to meet increased demand for advice arising from welfare reform changes in the Dumfries and Annan bureaux.

The Home Visiting Advice Service provided improved access to welfare benefits and money advice services in areas of multiple deprivation; improved connectivity with support in local agencies to encourage referrals for advice; advice to assist clients to better manage household income and prevent financial crises. This project ceased during the year.

Emergency Food project aims to ensure that vulnerable people using emergency food aid services have timely access to advice, information and practical support to address the underlying causes of food poverty. This project ceased in the year under review.

Pension Wise project provides pension guidance to people approaching 55 and over with a defined contribution pension.

CAS Energy Advice project aims to provide advice and practical assistance to reduce fuel poverty by reducing the amount of money spent on utility bills / increasing household income.

Big Energy Savings Network project provides advice and practical assistance for vulnerable consumers to help them save money on their energy costs.

Aspiring Communities project aims to increase financial resilience among the most deprived communities in the region by providing long term solutions to reduce poverty and enable inclusive growth.

Financial Inclusion Activity project provides financial inclusion activity for individuals referred from Links to Work who may require support such as money management, budgeting, borrowing, benefit and debt advice, credit union information, fuel poverty advice and any other relevant advice. Expenditure has been incurred on this project but this has been met by General funds until payment of grant funding has been accepted and made to the charity.

CAS Universal Credit project provides research into and reports on the impact of claiming Universal Credit for new claimants in Dumfries and Galloway.

CAS Scam Awareness project aims to deliver a local campaign to raise awareness of how the public can protect themselves against scams and of the need to report occurrence of scams locally.

CAS Martin Lewis project aims to provide support to people in financial difficulties. This project ceased in the year under review.

CAS Focus Group project aimed to consult on the views and experiences of clients and feedback to help shape the future of social security benefits in Scotland. This project ceased during the year.

CAS Rural Poverty project provides research and report on the cost of living throughout Dumfries and Galloway.

CAS Action Learning Fund was CAS funding towards helping people identify further learning opportunities. This project ceased during the year.

Website Development Project comprises of funding received from Transform Foundation for the development of a new charity website and funding was paid directly to the website developer. As the restriction was discharged in the year the fund has now came to an end and the website transferred to General funds.

All of these projects are funded by specific grants and the use thereof is restricted to expenditure towards the specific aims of the project, be it direct costs or fair allocation of overheads.

Transfers between funds

Transfers represent the transfer of the new website, at net book value, from the Website Development Project to General reserves as the restriction placed on funding received had been discharged in the year.
